Austin HOME Resolution Passes City Council

At it's November 6, 2023 meeting City Council passed the HOME resolution, which amends the land development code (LDC) by:

- Allowing up to three units: Increasing the number of homes allowed on single-family lots to three units, giving homeowners the ability to provide on-site housing options to family members, a caregiver, or earn additional income.
- Including Tiny Homes: Making it easier to install a tiny home, an accessible and affordable way to add a small house to a property.
- Creating Preservation and Sustainability Bonuses: Incentivize saving existing homes that conserve neighborhood character and help keep materials out of area landfills.
- Encouraging the Creation of Smaller Homes: Regulates the size and scale of houses while promoting smaller "starter homes" for homebuyers.

The amendments apply to Austin properties zoned as Single-Family Residence Large Lot (SF-1), Single-Family Residence Standard Lot (SF-2), and Family Residence (SF-3).

(HOME resolution continued)

Homeowners can check the zoning of their property using this interactive Property Profile tool (https://maps.austintexas.gov/GIS/ PropertyProfile/).

Homeowners are not required to do anything new to their property. They can continue using their property as a single-family home or choose new options and build up to three homes, including tiny homes.

These amendments also eliminate restrictions in the LDC regarding the number of unrelated adults who can live in one home, including single-family homes and apartments.

Occupancy limits will continue to be regulated under the City's Property Maintenance Code (Chapter 4, Section 404).

Austin follows the international code for occupancy limitations, which states in part "Except for qualifying efficiency units, a bedroom must contain at least 70 square feet; and a bedroom occupied by more than two adults must contain at least 120 feet plus an additional 50 square feet for each adult in excess of three." (404.4.1 Room area)

Julie Woods, President, called the meeting to order.

Minutes approved.

- 1. It's My Park Day registration is open for Nov. 4th tree mulching in Gillis Park. Gillis Park pool needs repairs, and hopefully will reopen in Summer 2024.
- 2. Andrew reported on the Mobility Planning group. The map of the neighborhood has been highlighted with ideas for improvements, the 1998 Neighborhood plan has been reviewed, and the Wilson-Lessin Ln cut through has been reviewed. HEB at Oltorf & Congress is being contacted to learn their plans for future ingress/egress. A suggestion was made to contact the AISD trustee regarding mobility and to be proactive about keeping Dawson Elementary School.
- 3. Julie provided an update on Austin Neighborhood Council issues, including Project Connect, the City Council's resolution to change the Land Development Code, and specific examples of city representatives apparently not following their own philosophies for affordable housing.
- 4. Nomination of DNA officers for 2024: Julie Woods, President; Andrew McCann, Vice President & Webmaster; Eliot Kimber, Newsletter Editor; Rebecca (Becky) Sheller, Secretary
- 5. Andrew expressed his desire to continue discussing the mission of the DNA.
- 6. Gillis Park needs to have lights on until at least 10 pm for safety reasons.

Meeting adjourned

Minutes of Dawson Neighborhood Plan Contact Team, October 9, 2023

- 1. Approval of September DNPCT meeting notes was made and voted.
- 2. In the December meeting we will vote for Officers for a staggered two year term. There is only one left serving presently after the December Meeting as the other board members have served their two year time plan.
- 3. Buffalo Express Clothing opened in the old Binswanger Glass on S. Congress on October 1st. Two days later they had several windows broken on the S Congress side. Sonar Beauty Salon on Krebs also had a window broken Saturday night. There were two electrical fires on Lessin/Krebs in a week around the new Reyna building site.
- 4. The Crow Bar burned down last year and they are looking for a new location. There was too much damage to the structure to rebuild.
- 5. The East Bouldin Creek Pond needs a good cleaning out. The small pond and the creek that feeds it also has tree debris in the channel and in the smaller body of water.
- 6. The City Council voted to change requirements to needed onsite parking, lowering the required onsite number for commercial properties, and housing projects to lower costs to build and impervious cover.
